## EASTERN FOUNDATION FUND NEWS

The Eastern Foundation Fund was



established as an endowment to provide funds which will assure a sound financial basis for present and future operation of the

Eastern Federation. Only the interest from the fund is used, and expenditures require the approval of the EFMLS Executive Board. Donations made to the fund, whether by clubs or their individual members, are all included in tallying the accumulated contributions of the club. When a club's accumulated contributions reach a new 100% level of giving (\$1.00 per club member) that club is presented a Certificate of Appreciation recognizing their generosity and commitment to the EFF.

And when a club reaches a new 1000% level of giving their name is engraved on a plate and added to the EFF "Roll of Honor" plaque. Without the generosity of these clubs and their members some important programs of the Eastern Federation would either not be possible or would be greatly reduced.

This year's Wildacres Appreciation Award goes to two people, but one family; Bruce and Cathy


Gaber. Cathy actually came up with the idea for this award when she was EFMLS President. Before her untimely passing in late 2007, she originated
